

Interscholastic Advocacy Competition Teams

Participation in interscholastic advocacy competition teams is determined by the faculty advisors for the ADR Board, Moot Court Board, and Trial Team, in consultation with the Director of the Advocacy Board and Dean of the College of Law. Absent extraordinary circumstances, students on these teams will be selected through competitive processes during or after their first year in law school. Competitive procedures will be published to the entire student body. Students on official teams may receive academic credit for their work, subject to limitations on credits earned outside the classroom and in accordance with guidance provided by the Curriculum Committee.

The College of Law spends significant resources in selecting and training teams that will represent it at the highest level. Therefore, students who are not on a team officially sponsored by the College of Law may not register in an interscholastic competition. If the College of Law determines that one or more students have registered in a competition without official permission, the College of Law will withdraw that team from competition and may impose other discipline on the students who violated this policy.
